Interesting Facts

Did you know...

One Mother and Daughter have both been Miss Indian Arizona

They are Delores Castro Savala, and Sonya Savala-Track, both from the Kaibab-Pauite Tribe in Northern Arizona.

Two Sisters have been Miss Indian Arizona

Veronica Homer was the first Miss Indian Arizona. Her sister Cindy Homer was also Miss Indian Arizona 12 years later.

Three Miss Indian Arizona Titleholders have gone on to become Miss Indian America

They are Maxine Norris, Gracie Welsh, and Vivian Juan Saunders.

Five Tribes have had a Miss Indian Arizona at least 5 times

The San Carlos Apache and Colorado River Indian Tribes have both had 8 titleholders. The Navajo Nation and White Mountain Apache Tribe have both had 7 titleholders. The Tohono O'odham Nation has had 6 titleholders.

Arizona Tribes

There are 22 Federally Recognized Indian Tribes within the state of Arizona. The tribes live on lands that are very diverse, from the high mountain forests of Eastern Arizona, to the low desert of the Colorado River Valley, and the bottom of the Grand Canvon!













Miss Indian Arizona at Miss Indian World

Three of the twenty six contestants in the 2009 Miss Indian World Pageant were former Miss Indian Arizona Royalty. Evereta Thinn (Navajo), Miss Indian Arizona 2007-2008, Cissimarie Juan (Tohono O'odham), Miss Indian Arizona 2006-2007, and Tara Kitcheyan (San Carlos Apache), Second Runner Up Miss Indian Arizona 2006-2007, represented Arizona Tribes in the 2009 Miss Indian World Pageant held in Albuquerque, New Mexico on April 23-25. The event took place during the 26th Annual Gathering of Nations Powwow.

The contestants competed for the title in the areas of public speaking, traditional presentation, personal interview, essay, and dancing ability. Brooke Grant (Hoopa/Yurok/Karuk/Chippewa) of California was crowned on Saturday, April 25, at the Gathering of Nations Powwow at the University of New Mexico University Arena, known locally as "The Pit." Evereta Thinn was selected as first Runner Up and also received awards for Best Dancer and Miss Congeniality. Tara Kitcheyan was selected as Second Runner-Up.

The new Miss Indian World will travel to many native and indigenous communities around the world on behalf of the powwow. The Emcee for the traditional talent presentation was Hattie Kauffman, a journalist for CBS News

"The Miss Indian World title is a prestigious honor in the Native American and indigenous world. The winner will bring together native and indigenous people throughout North America by providing a cultural link between tribes." said Derek Mathews, organizer of the Gathering of Nations. Miss Indian World represents all native and indigenous peoples as a cultural goodwill ambassador.

The Miss Indian Arizona Association is very proud of these ladies, and recognizes them for all their hard work and preparation for this prestigious competition.

Ashley Vincent Crowned new Miss Ak-Chin.

Ashley Vincent, a senior at Maricopa High School, was crowned the new Miss Ak-Chin on March 30, 2009. Vincent is the daughter of Lemuel Vincent, from Ak-Chin, and Judy Hall, from the Duck Valley Shoshone Tribe. She lives on the Ak-Chin reservation with her grandmother.

Vincent is part of the Ak-Chin Youth Council, and has been for quite some time. She loves playing sports, especially basketball and softball. She played in the Native American Basketball Invitational (NABI) tournament with the Ak-Chin girls in 2008 for the very first time.

As the new Miss Ak-Chin, Ashley has ridden in the Tohono O'odham Rodeo and Fair parade, the O'odham Tash and Mul-Chu-Tha parade, and also participated in the O'odham Tash Powwow. During her reign, she plans on doing more activities and projects that will have a a broad appeal to all ages in her community. One thing she would like to see is a Boys and Girls Club. She knows that it will be hard work to form, but that the club is worth pursuing for the benefit of families in her community. She also wants to do more activities that will bring the Ak-Chin culture back, and to get the younger kids involved, so that they will grow up knowing their traditions. When asked about the challenges before her, she replied "I promise you, the community, that I will try my hardest to do the best I can."
